table. The setup may be such that you can gain a trick by making a certain play, with no corresponding chance of losing

Let's say you're in six spades and West leads a trump. You're off to a bad start, for, if West had led anything else, you would have made the hand by simply ruffing two hearts in dummy.

There's no use crying over spilt milk, so you win the spade with the nine, ruff a diamond, cash the A-K of hearts, ruff a heart, and ruff another diamond.

You then draw two rounds of trumps, bringing yourself to the crucial point of the hand. You might now feel tempted to try the club finesse, but that would be the wrong thing to do, for it would give you only about a 50-50 shot at the contract.

Instead, you should lead your last heart. This play Suppose someone offers you cannot cost you a thing, but it might - and in the actual case would - make the slam. East wins with the queen and is forced to return a diamond or a club into dummy's pair of-A-Q's. As a result, you make twelve tricks.

> It is true that if West had the queen the heart play would not accomplish a thing - but in that case you could still take the club finesse. Thus, by playing the fourth heart, you have practically everything to gain and nothing to lose.
