Romance Pockmarked With Constant Quarrels

DEAR MARY HAWORTH: I am a girl, 24. I have been in love with a young man for over a year and we fuss continually about another girl.

Three months after we started dating I discovered that they were going together — because she asked me straight out if I minded her going with him.

She said that she did mind his going out with me. She asked him, in my presence, how about quitting me for her. He told her then that he didn't want her, he wanted me.

Later I learned that they were still seeing each other. He told me, when I asked, that he sees her only because she puts herself in his way.

Back in 1965, I did something that wasn't very pretty. I didn't bring myself to tell him about it. But someone else told him, not long ago. Now we fuss about that all the time, too — and I don't see the sense of it.

This girl says she loves him. And she always shows up the same time I do; and he looks

sick when I look at him. I've asked him if he is still seeing her and all he will say is, "If I were, she would tell you."

I love him very much and I'm very mixed-up, because he has said he loves me but at times it is hard to believe. I can't think what he has done to me — as I try to break off but find myself crying and telling him how much I love him and how hard I'm trying to end our affair. What can I do about this awful feeling I have for him?

Three Factors

DEAR M.J.: My estimate of the situation is that you and the young man probably would have a pretty smooth love story if it weren't for the other girl's brutal determination to wreck that possibility.

I think he is sincere in saying that he wants you and doesn't want her, if he has to make a showdown choice. It's probably true that he loves you (to the best of his ability), and sees her only (or mostly) because she puts herself in his way.

Overall, I see three factors conspiring to make big trouble for you in relation to him.

The first factor is his own weakness of character that finds him unable or unwilling to put the other girl to flight, with steady instructions to get out and stay out of his life.

Two Approaches

The second factor is the girl's ruthless intention (evident in her actions) to make a hopelessly unhappy mess of your feelings for him, and his for you, if she can't have him, free and clear.

And the third factor is your own immaturity, insecure, loving and being loved in the courting game. What you are crying for (and lamenting the lack of) is wholehearted reliable true-blue devotion — a kind of paid-up insurance against loss to rivals. And the fact is, you don't get this brand of happiness, or this kind of insurance, in romance with a weakling.

If you were anywhere near as tough and resourceful in playing your cards as the other girl is tough and purposeful in trying to spoil your hand, she couldn't take a trick. My advice is, either break off with the guy, or get professional psychological counseling, in the A-B-Cs of standing your ground, in female shoving matches.

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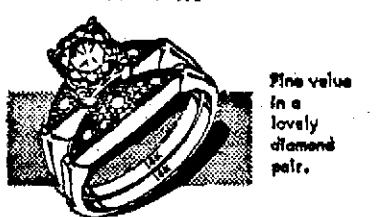
